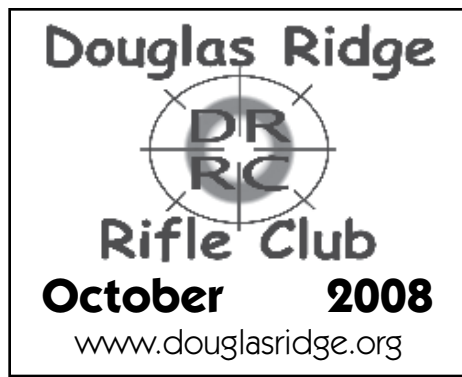
The outdoor season has ended for smallbore competition. There are a lot of indoor matches coming up, hopefully I can talk some of our juniors into competing. On September 6th and 7th, Jerika Wallace and I went to compete in the conventional smallbore prone match held in Tacoma, Washington. The match is divided into eight matches, four on Saturday, four on Sunday. Saturday is metallic sights only and Sunday is any sights. The match is divided into classification groups. Jerika is a marksman. In her class on Saturday for the 50 yard match she placed first with a 393 and 21x's. Fifth place for the Dewar match (50 yard and 100 yard) with a 376 and 7x's. Fifth place in the 100 yard match with a 379 and 9x's and 4th place with a 371 and 9x's in the 50 meter match. On Sunday, Jerika placed first again in the 50 yard match with a 397 and 17x's, first place in the Dewar match with a 391 and 12x's, second in the 100 yard match with a 385 and 10x's and third with a 378 and 10x's in the 50 meter match. I have to mention that she shot with iron sights on both days and that each match is out of a possible 400 points. Jerika is also a very active shooter in high power matches and shotgun matches around the state. She likes to hunt as well. If you have the pleasure of meeting this young girl, congratulate her for all of her hard work in the shooting sports and her awesome accomplishments.

Next time that you are in the indoor range take a look at the junior board located by the bathrooms, there you will see all of our young shooters who are involved in the NRA Qualification Program. Encourage them, they are the future of the sport you love so much.

Marijuana Grows on the Increase

With the increase of unlawful marijuana grows being located on State and National land hunters should be aware of their surroundings while recreating.

If you observe camp sites away from main roads, irrigation equipment, cultivated areas or marijuana plants, leave the area immediately from the same direction you entered. Note the location of the suspicious activities and

report that information to your local law enforcement agency or the Oregon State Police TIP line, 1-800-472-7888.

Oregon is Black Bear Country

Follow these guidelines to avoid conflicts:

- Keep food in bear proof containers or store in trunk vehicle.

Be aware of your surroundings at all times.

- Know that by calling in an animal, you may attract bear.

Carry bear spray and know how to use it.

- Watch for fresh bear signs such as tracks, droppings or diggings.

Be careful when field-dressing a deer or elk. Make noise; talk and laugh so bears know you are there.

- If you have to leave the carcass overnight, hang it at least 10-12 feet off the ground and 5-6 from nearby trees in an open area.

Hunters

Please complete a survey for each big game tag you purchased for a hunt listed in the 2008 Oregon Big Game Regulations—except for Bighorn Sheep and Rocky Mountain Goat tags. These hunters are required to check out of the hunt area; therefore, there is no need to report again. Note, turkey hunters, please complete a survey for 2008 fall turkey tags.

Every hunter is required to report harvest and effort information for each tag purchased. Information from hunters who did not hunt or did not harvest an animal is as important as from those who did take an animal. Please report even if you received a comparison telephone survey call for the hunt this year.

State “Emergency Powers” vs. The Right to Arms

After Hurricane Katrina, many New Orleans residents legally armed themselves to protect their lives and property from civil disorder. With no way to call for help, and police unable to respond, honest citizens were able to defend themselves and their neighbors against looters, arsonists and other criminals.

However, just when these people needed guns the most, New Orleans’s Police Superintendent ordered the confiscation of firearms, allegedly under a state emergency powers law. “No one will be able to be armed,” he said. “Guns will be taken. Only law enforcement will be allowed to have guns.” (Fortunately, an NRA lawsuit brought an end to the seizures—along with a far-fetched denial that confiscation had ever been ordered. Following this, Judge Carl J. Barbier, presiding over the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Louisiana, held New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin and Police Chief Warren Riley in contempt for “failure to provide initial disclosures and to compel answers to discovery” during NRA’s injunction against the City for their illegal gun confiscations.)

Of course, no one condones the mindless violence of those who would loot a helpless city, or shoot at rescue workers. But one reason for the citizens to retain a legal right to arms, is precisely because the government has no legal duty to protect them. Legislative bodies can, and should, act to protect the self-defense rights of citizens at the times when those rights are most important.

Unfortunately, many states have “emergency powers” laws that give the government permission to suspend or limit gun sales, and to prohibit or restrict citizens from transporting or carrying firearms. In some states, authorities are authorized to seize guns outright from citizens who’ve committed no crime – and who would then be defenseless against disorder.

The movement to change these laws is gaining speed. Just two months after Hurricane Katrina, the Louisiana legislature – with only one dissenting vote – adopted a resolution declaring

“the policy of the state of Louisiana to protect and uphold the citizens’ right to keep and bear arms in their residences, businesses, and means of transport, and on their persons,” condemning the seizure of firearms from New Orleans citizens, and announcing it planned to amend Louisiana’s emergency powers law “to rectify the denial of these rights.” Since then, 21 additional states have joined Louisiana by passing laws to protect the rights of law-abiding gun owners by prohibiting the confiscation of firearms during a time of emergency.

Congress and President Bush also saw the need to act to protect gun owners’ rights during emergencies. H.R. 5013, the “Disaster Recovery Personal Protection Act,” was introduced in the House by Congressman Bobby Jindal (LA - 1) and passed the House on July 25, 2006 with a broad bi-partisan margin of 322-99. Senator David Vitter (R-La) introduced the Senate version of the bill and added it as an Amendment to Homeland Security Appropriations, which passed the United States Senate by 84-16, the largest margin of victory for a NRA-backed measure. On October 9, 2006, President George W. Bush signed this legislation into law.

In the past, America has balanced emergency needs with respect for constitutional rights. Months before Pearl Harbor, the U.S. Congress passed the Property Requisition Act of 1941, which allowed the President, as a last resort, to seize needed war materials “upon the payment of fair and just compensation.”⁵ The Congress, concerned about the prospect of gun confiscation, included language to prohibit registration or seizure of privately owned firearms. America and its allies went on to win the greatest armed conflict in history. Today, Congress and the state legislatures should follow that lead.

- 1 I will consider myself an invited guest of the landowner, seeking his permission, and so conducting myself that I may be welcome in the future.
- 2 I will obey the rules of safe gun handling and will courteously but firmly insist that others who hunt with me do the same.
- 3 I will obey all game laws and regulations, and will insist that my companions do likewise.
- 4 I will do my best to acquire those marksmanship and hunting skills, which insure clean, sportsmanlike kills.
- 5 I will support conservation efforts, which can assure good hunting for the future generations of Americans.
- 6 I will pass along to younger hunters the attitudes and skills essential to a true outdoor sportsman.
